#### **Book Recommendation**







His new rules range from having libraries open day and night to ensuring that anyone who wanted a dog, or a bicycle, would have one, and grown-ups would go to nursery once a month to learn how to play. This joyous picture book is a beautifully illustrated story which gets young readers thinking about what they would change if they were in charge. It covers major socio-political themes including the education, immigration, healthcare and environment in a child-friendly, approachable way.

The students have written their own limericks, acrostic, kennings and shape poems.


The students had a poetry competition, where they read their chosen poem and I was fortunate enough to be the judge!
